






Socio-Economic Indexes for Areas (SEIFA) is an ABS product that ranks areas in Australia according to relative socio-economic advantage and disadvantage. SEIFA has 4 indexes. The Index of Relative Socio-economic Disadvantage (IRSD) is shown. It summarises variables that indicate relative disadvantage and ranks areas from most disadvantaged to least disadvantaged. *Deciles: all areas across Victoria are ordered from lowest to highest score, then the lowest 10% of areas are given a decile number of 1, the next lowest 10% of areas are given a decile number of 2 and so on, up to the highest 10% of areas which are given a decile number of 10. This means that areas are divided up into ten equal sized groups, depending on their score.

Some areas in the outskirts of this town (not affecting the interpretation of the map) may have been excluded
